OMAHA'S RECORD FOR HIGH FOOD PRICES

A headline in the World-Herald
Sunday made it appear that food
costs more in Omaha than in any
of a list of fifty cities which was
given. While Omaha prices in July
on most of forty commodities were
higher than in the other cities, the
average was lower than in twenty
of the fifty cities. The Omaha aver-
age was \$12.15 against an average of
all fifty cities of \$12.02. Omaha was
higher in per cent of increase for the
month than the others.
