

death. She was the wife of Captain Arthur Eliot, a dramatist and grandson of the late earl of St. Germans. Mrs. Eliot, better known as Mrs. Mabel Louise Atherton, was the divorced wife of Colonel Thomas Atherton.

Evidence given at the inquest tended to show that Mrs. Eliot killed herself after having had disagreements with her husband over his stepdaughter. Testimony showed that Mrs. Eliot lived with Captain Eliot only a short time.

of skins, \$12,012,000 of kerosene oil and \$39,243,000 of wheat. American imports from Germany consisted principally of toys, potash, dyestuffs, chemicals and drugs, and delicate precision instruments, also pottery and porcelains and graniteware.

Cut off from German supplies, American firms began the manufacture of many commodities previously obtained from Germany and legislation to protect these industries from "dumping" by German firms is now pending in congress.

New Steamer Lines.

Steamship lines to Hamburg and Bremen, Germany, will be established as soon as cargoes are available at American ports, the shipping board announced today.

Texas Guardsmen Check Race Clash

Long View, Tex., July 11.—Nearly 200 members of the Texas national guard from Dallas and Nacogdoches, ordered here today by Governor W. P. Hobby to prevent further clashes between whites and negroes, were arriving tonight by train and automobile. The situation remains quiet after a clash early today in which four white men were wounded when a small party of whites was fired upon by negroes estimated to have numbered seventy-five.

The trouble today occurred when twelve or fifteen white men were waylaid and fired upon in the negro section of Long View, where they had gone in search of F. L. Jones, a negro school teacher accused of causing the publication of statements derogatory to a young woman of this county in a negro newspaper published in Chicago.
